In the Spotlight - Ronda Jones

Our spotlight for this issue is on Ronda Jones, who is one busy lady, as you will soon discover. Ronda is one of the original members of the Mississinewa Valley Band. She was born and raised in Grant County and has lived all her life within a 20-mile radius. She began her musical instruction in 5th grade, choosing the trumpet because it was the only option at the time. It was the instrument her brother played, but was now sitting in a closet, unused. She found that she loved the instrument, so she stuck with it through her years at Mississinewa High School and then Marion College (now Indiana Wesleyan University). The business is located in Gas City and is a commercial contractor employing millwrights, ironworkers and operators who install and maintain production equipment in factories. The business has thrived and has just recently expanded to a location in Kokomo.



During the ten years after graduating from college and starting the business, Ronda was busy working at various jobs and didn't have time to play her trumpet. She was given an invitation to join the new community band that was forming in Grant County, so she decided to go. She has been an integral part of the Mississinewa Valley Band ever since, serving as board

tee member and section leader. She also organizes and leads the brass quintet and sometimes directs swing band rehearsals.

She met her husband, John, at a tractor pull in Van Buren, and they were married within a year after they started dating. They live with their two schnauzers and a boxer in the first house they bought 25 years ago. They like to travel and are actively involved as members of College Wesleyan Church. John often helps out at MVB concerts by manning the spot-



Musical Instruments Quiz


Beginning with any letter and moving in any direction, how many musical instruments can you find that are mentioned in the Bible?

Weird and Wacky Facts about Music

- * The longest piano piece of any kind is 'Vexations' by Erik Satie. It consists of a 180-note composition which, on the composer's orders, must be repeated 840 times so that the whole performance is 18 hours 40 minutes. Its first reported public performance in September 1963, in the Pocket Theater, New York City, required a relay team of 10 pianists. The New York Times critic fell asleep at 4 a.m. and the audience dwindled to 6 masochists. At the conclusion, one sado-masochist shouted 'Encore!'
- *American composer John Cage (1912–1992) composed a work in 1952 entitled 4' 33", which consists of four minutes and thirty-three seconds of silence.
- *A grand piano can be played faster than an upright (spinet) piano.
- *The harmonica is the world's best-selling music instrument.
- *The longest rendering of a national anthem was 'God Save the King,' performed by a German military band on the platform of Rathenau railway station in Brandenburg, on February 9, 1909. King Edward VII was struggling inside the train to get into his German Field-Marshall uniform, so the band had to play the anthem 17 consecutive times.
- *Termites eat wood twice as fast when listening to heavy metal music.
